HENRY KISSI

enry Alfred Kissinger died on November 29th. On that, we can all agree.

Well, perhaps we're being overly optimistic.

To be clear, we're not saying we think that Henry the K is still alive somewhere, maintained in some quasi-lifelike state by a cabal of mad scientists.

We're just saying that considering present circumstances, it's possibile—even probable—that someone in this great nation of ours is convinced that the original Doctor Strangelove is currently hooked up to a maze of tubes and cables and still breathing. Or burbling in a jar, "Futurama"-style.

If anyone actually does believe that scenario it's ironic, since Kissinger did so much damage not just to the world—innumerable deaths, bomblets exploding to this day—but to our ability to accurately perceive the world.

The assassination of John F. Kennedy broke something in America, but our ship of state really foundered in Vietnam. And the damage extended well beyond the division between the hawks and the doves. American foreign policy at the time was dominated by the so-called domino theory: we must fight the Viet Cong in 'Nam's Central Highlands, lest Charlie, in his pajamas and sandals, ambush us on the streets of San Diego.

The war did have a domino effect, just not the one we were warned about. The cost of the war blew up the budget. Bye bye to the uplift of Johnson's Great Society, welcome to persistent wealth and income inequality. So long, 1944 Bretton Woods Agreement and the relatively stable global economy which it tion.


enabled, say hello to chaos.

Kissinger's role was central in bringing this all about. His audacity and duplicity were such that even Shakespeare might not have dared to create him. Wikipedia has the receipts:

In August 1968, Kissinger wrote to Harriman, who was leading the American delegation at the Paris peace

talks: "My dear Averell... I am through with Republican politics. The party is hopeless and unfit to govern." On 17 September 1968, Kissinger arrived in Paris and served as an unofficial consultant to the American delegation. At the time, Kissinger spoke of his disgust with the Republican candidate, Richard

Nixon, saying: "Three days of the week I think I'll vote for Hubert. The other days I think I won't vote at all." But at the same time, Kissinger was in contact with the Nixon campaign and began to share information about the progress of the peace talks. Kissinger began to call Richard Allen, Nixon's foreign policy adviser, from a public telephone booth, offering information in exchange for which he wanted a senior position if Nixon won the election. On 12 October 1968, Kissinger told Allen that Harriman had "broken open the champagne" because he persuaded Johnson to order a bombing halt of North Vietnam. Allen called John Mitchell, Nixon's campaign manager, who agreed that this was most important information. As a reward, Mitchell told Allen that Kissinger would receive the senior post he craved, with Allen saying the office of National Security Adviser would suit Kissinger the best. At the same time, Kissinger was in contact with the Democratic candidate, Vice President Hubert Humphrey, lobbying for a senior post if Humphrey won the elec-



Historian Robert Dallek and CIA analyst William Bundy have argued that the failure of the Paris peace talks in 1968 could not be attributed to Kissinger alone. Perhaps that's so, but not for lack of trying.

Kissinger certainly achieved his primary objective: a powerful job in the White House. Nixon, his boss, had campaigned on a "secret plan to end the war." In practice, that plan was to keep killing as many Vietnamese as possible—and as many Americans as necessary in the process—until it was time to get re-elected. Then he could run as the man who had finally brought peace to whatever might be left of Viet-

None of this seemed to trouble his National Security Advisor/Secretary of State. In fact, hardly anything seems to have ever troubled Kissinger.

On April 6, 1971, as our allies in West Pakistan were slaughter-

ing Bengalis in East Pakistan, the U.S. Consul General there cabled Washington: "Our government has failed to denounce the suppression of democracy. Our government has failed to denounce atrocities. Our government has failed to take forceful measures to protect its citizens while at the same time bending over backwards to placate the West Pak[istan] dominated government and to lessen any deservedly negative international public relations impact against them. Our government has evidenced what many will consider moral bankruptcy....Private Americans have expressed disgust. We, as professional civil servants, express our dissent with current policy and fervently hope that our true and lasting interests here can be defined and our policies redirected in order to salvage our nation's position as a moral leader of the free world."

It's been called "the most strongly worded expression of dissent in the history of the U.S. Foreign Service," but it had no effect on Kissinger and Nixon. They were scheming to use West Pakistan in their rapprochement with China, so they did nothing to intervene. By year's end between 300,000 and 3,000,000 Bengalis had been murdered.

A Sunday edition of the New York Times might be sufficient to catalog the myriad crimes of Henry Kissinger. We are not that newspaper. On the occasion of announcing his demise, the above must suffice.

We will only add this final irony: he lived to see his status as the Master of Lies surpassed—indeed, transcended—though his overinflated self-regard probably prevented him from seeing the resemblance.

Once again, Marx has been proven more or less right: the seemingly-interminable reign of Kissinger's influence was tragic. The ongoing threat of Trump is tragic, too—but also a farce.

Dubai Is a Fitting Host for the Climate Circus

climate conference began, there was deep concern and alarm over the head of one of the world's largest oil companies being appointed president of the COP28 summit. The climate talks taking place in December 2023 were hosted by the United Arab Emirates (UAE) and overseen by Sultan Al Jaber, a man who happens to be in charge of the UAE's national oil company Abu Dhabi National Oil Company. It's a fitting illustration of an old idiom that the fox is in charge of the hen house.

Al Jaber's appointment was such a clear conflict of interest that a group of United States lawmakers, including House Representatives Barbara Lee, Rashida Tlaib, and Jamaal Bowman, and Senators Bernie

Their warning fell on deaf ears and yet their fears proved to be correct months later when The Guardian newspaper published Al Jaber's revealing remarks made at a November 2023 online climate meeting. Climate justice leader and former President of Ireland, Mary Robinson, rightly pointed out that the climate crisis was hurting women and children, and that Al Jaber had the power to do something about it. The oil company head angrily retorted that her comments were "alarmist," and asserted that, "There is no sci-

He went on to say, "Show me the roadmap for a phase-out of fossil fuel that will allow for sustainable socioeconomic development, unless you want to take the world back into caves." Sounding defensive and cornered, Al Jaber added, "Show me the solutions. Stop the pointing of fingers. Stop it."

Adding (fossil) fuel to the fire, the BBC published an exposé days before COP28 began revealing that "The United Arab Emirates planned to use its role as the host of UN climate talks as an opportunity to strike oil and gas deals." UAE authorities did not deny the reports and instead responded with shocking hubris that "private meetings are private."

Such shenanigans reveal the futility of relying on the UN's annual COP meetings to phase out fosstrophic climate change. Whereas earlier COP meetings fixated on the goal of "net zero emissions"—a phrase that climate activists rightly denounced as greenwashing and propaganda—the favorite phrase at this year's COP28 appeared to be a "phase down" of fossil fuels.

The idea is that oil and gas producers may consider, someday in the far future, to start producing fewer fossil fuels than they do now. "Phase down" is a clever dilution of "phase out." It is a sleight of hand intended to assuage concern over the warming climate all while remaining on a path to climate destruction.

The first draft of the COP28 agreement spelled out the two terms as interchangeable, referring to a

"phasedown/out." Al Jaber reflected this equation of two different words even as he sought to maintain his sil fuels in order to stave off cata- credentials as head of COP28, saying that he has maintained "over and over that the phase-down and the phase-out of fossil fuel is inevitable."

That Al Jaber would engage in trickery to protect fossil fuels is hardly surprising given his role as head of the Abu-Dhabi-based oil firm. In his leaked remarks to Robinson, he proclaimed that phasing out oil and gas was not feasible, "unless you want to take the world back into caves.'

But it is precisely the continued use of fossil fuels that may take us back to the stone age. We may all be living in caves someday, seeking high ground from the rising waters

of the warming oceans, all while Al Jaber and his ilk are ensconced in the luxury bunkers of the wealthy.

It is an image that reflects the reality of Dubai, a gleaming, futuristic city where the Emirates pays lip service to climate progress as host of COP28, while simultaneously conspiring to secure oil and gas deals on the side. It's a city that is defined by yet another idiom: trying to have your cake and eat it too.

I know, because I was born and raised in Dubai, a child of Indians who emigrated in 1970 to a land known as the Trucial Sheikhdoms—one year before they formally emerged as a single sovereign nation called the United Arab Emirates. My parents' tenure in the UAE was older than the nation itself and while they toiled for more than 50 years as part of an immigrant workforce that

outnumbers Emiratis 9 to 1, they were never afforded citizenship, as were none of their three children born there.

The Emirates, with the blessing of its former colonial master Britain, and its newer imperial partners, the U.S. and Israel, has presided over an oil-funded project fueled by exploited immigrant labor to emerge as one of the most important trading hubs in the world: a seductive tourist trap dotted by massive shopping malls and billboards beneath which teeming labor camps invisibly keep the wheels of capitalism turning. It touts a liberalism that allows women to work, drive, and even hold limited leadership, all while suppressing the rights of low-wage female domestic workers. It pledges sustainability while marketing itself to global in-

It is hypocrisy manifested; a pretty façade of a promising future built on an age-old model of serfdom, a na-

tion that celebrates the freedom to consume, but clamps down on the freedom to speak. In other words, it is a capitalist's wet dream. What better place for fossil fuel promoters to pretend they care about the future of the planet?

The COP meetings have been a disastrous distraction from the urgent need to end fossil fuel production and consumption. Even Christiana Figueres, former executive secretary of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, who is considered the architect of the 2015 Paris climate accord, is so disgusted by the state of proceedings that she called the COP "a circus."

Having Dubai host the largest annual international climate gathering is a desperate bid by a dying industry to maintain relevance. Energy forecasting predictions point to a grim future for petrostates like the UAE. It's no wonder Al Jaber has publicly tied himself into knots of contradictions. His nation's future depends on the continued flow of oil and gas, while our world's future depends on an immediate termination of the poisonous fuels.

Voters Say Big Oil Should Pay for Climate Damage

As yet another United Nations Climate Change Conference winds down without a meaningful agreement on phasing out fossil fuels, polling released Tuesday by Data for Progress revealed strong bipartisan support among U.S. voters for legislation forcing oil and gas companies to pay for their role in fueling the planetary emergency.

The survey of 1,279 U.S. voters, conducted November 3-6, found that around two-thirds of all likely voters support such legislation, a +40-point net margin. Among Democrats, support for the pro-

posed bill is 88 percent, while 61 percent of Independent and 46 percent of Republicans either strongly or somewhat back the proposal.

Asked if they were more or less likely to support elected officials who prioritize making Big Oil pay for its climate pollution, 64 percent of overall respondents, 89 percent of Democrats, and 58 percent of Independents answered "more likely." Republicans were the only group whose members were less likely to back officials who would make oil and gas companies pay for their pollution.

"In a resounding call for accountability, two-thirds of the American people support legislation demanding industry titans like Exxon and Shell shoulder their fair share of the climate damages inflicted by fossil fuels," Fossil Free Media communications director Cassidy DiPaola said in a statement.

"With COP spotlighting the towering price tag of climate change, voters resoundingly endorse fossil fuel companies contributing their fair share to address a crisis they helped manufacture and still refuse to help fix," she added, referencing the U.N. summit.

The poll follows the September launch of the "Make Polluters Pay" campaign, a public relations blitz meant to drum up public support for suing fossil fuel corporations which knew that their products caused climate change decades before publicly saying so.

That month, California joined dozens of states and municipalities that have targeted fossil fuel giants in court, suing five fossil fuel giants—ExxonMobil, Shell, BP, ConocoPhillips, and Chevron—over their decadeslong effort to deceive the public about their products' role in fueling global heating.

The new survey's findings also came as so-called "loss and damage"—the harm caused by anthropogenic climate change—features prominently at COP28. However, climate campaigners were once again disappointed as the United States and other top polluters failed to make meaningful contributions to the fund.

for the climate catastrophe pledged just \$700 million among them, the equivalent of under 0.2 percent of the irreversible losses Global South countries suffer each year during the worsening planetary crisis. The United States pledged a paltry \$17.5 million.

"Every year, we travel across oceans to come to these negotiations and we continue to get only drops of ambition," Drue Slatter, a Fijian climate campaigner attending COP28, wrote in an opinion piece published Tuesday by Common Dreams.

"Facing the catastrophic effects of extreme weather at home and watching the slow progress of the negotiations, it was hard not to be pessimistic before we even arrived at COP28," Slatter added. "But the point is that we can't afford not to be here, we can't afford to stop fighting because what's at stake is our very survival."

GOP Backs Boebert's Plan: Make Taxpayers Foot the Bill for Big Oil by Jessica Corbett

Fossil fuel industry-funded Republicans on the U.S. House Natural Resources Committee voted Wednesday to advance Rep. Lauren Boebert's bill that would saddle taxpayers with the massive cost of cleaning up oil and gas wells on federal lands.

"Corporations awarded a lease to drill on federal land must post a bond. If the leasing corporation abandons an exploration site, goes bankrupt, or fails to plug a well securely, the posted bond covers the cost of doing so," Public Citizen explained this week in a statement opposing the proposal.

The Colorado Republican's Restoring American Energy Dominance Act (H.R. 6009) would block a proposed rule from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) revising federal regulations "to update the fees, rents, royalties, and bonding requirements related to oil and gas leasing, development, and production" in line with the Inflation Reduction Act signed by President Joe Biden last year.

Based on a BLM review of the costs to plug orphaned wells, the rule—strongly opposed by polluting oil and gas companies—would raise the minimum lease bond amount to \$150,000 and the minimum statewide bond to \$500,000. It would also end the use of nationwide bonds.

"Without these crucial protections, the oil and gas industry could stick taxpayers with a massive bill of between \$2.9 billion and \$17.7 billion," Public Citizen's Alan Zibel warned in a report published Tuesday in anticipation of the House committee vote.

"We already allow far too much climate-destroying fossil fuel drilling on public lands in Western states," Zibel added in a statement Wednesday. "The least we can do is ensure taxpayers don't get stuck subsidizing the fossil fuel industry's cost of doing business."

"Even as U.S. fossil fuel production soars to record levels," he said, "Republicans are doing the bidding of fossil fuel lobbyists by trying to block modest, sensible efforts to reduce blatant, long-standing giveaways in the system for leasing public lands for oil and gas production."

In the leadup to the vote, Accountable.US highlighted that the "Big Oil-backed, far-right extremists" on the Republican-led committee have taken at least \$3.8 million in campaign contributions from the oil and gas industry during their political

Rep. Garret Graves (R-La.) leads the pack with \$850,945, followed by committee Chair Bruce Westerman (R-Ark.) at \$416,575, based on the group's analysis of OpenSecrets data. Boebert, who is only in her second term, ranks sixth, with \$121,150.

"Rep. Boebert is plainly on the side of the oil and gas compa-

Thank you very much for writing. Your letter sent us down a most entertaining rabbit hole. It also sent us back twenty years, to a much simpler time. That certainly was a refreshing respite. Now we're back, shaking our heads, and asking, as Dorothy Parker did a century ago, "What fresh hell is this?"

An AP story, datelined Sunday, November 2, 2003, began, "Gov. Craig Benson welcomed members of the Free State Project to New Hampshire on Saturday, saying he was excited about their plans to move to the state and promote their agenda of smaller government. 'We'd love to have you, 'Benson told several Free Staters at the annual convention of the state Libertarian Party, held at the Highlander Inn. 'We don't have to agree on everything to make things happen. What we have to agree on is that we're going to leave things better than we found them,'

"[W]e're going to leave things better than we found them... "As letter writer and editor, Jane, we seem irreconcilably opposed on the question of the supposedly sacred inviolability of single-family zoning. So be it. But surely we can agree that this sentence fragment from Gov. Benson, about the Free State Project, contains perhaps the highest level of irony ever seen in these pages.

For the record, a 2022 Suffolk University/Boston Globe survey of 500 Granite Staters found that 256 had never heard of the Free State Project. Among those who had, 67 had no opinion one way or the other. That left 177. Of those 177 who are aware of the FSP, just 49 had a favorable opinion, while 128 had an unfavorable opinion. That's a ratio of 2.6 to 1 against.

The late and much lamented blogger Susan the Bruce called Benson "The Voldemort of the NHGOP"—he who must not be named. The one-term governor certainly earned that moniker, and not just because he welcomed the FSP. His two years in office mortified many Republicans. Of course, this was back in the day when some of them still had the capacity to feel shame.

Also, let us not forget, four months into his term the Old Man came down from the Mountain. A recent New York Times article presented "three entities most responsible" for the high civilian death toll in Gaza. ("The Morning," December 7, 2023)


So, Mr. Trump has publicly stated that he would abuse his power, violate his oath, and go after all those he considers his enemies. On the first day of his second term.



A recent United Nations report documents 10,000 Ukrainian civilian deaths due to Russia's aggressive war. That number is dwarfed by an estimated 15,000 Palestinian civilians killed in Israel's military response to Hamas' 1,200 murders October 7th. How then should we characterize the deaths of nearly 319,000 American civilians by what Brown University medical researchers call "Covid-19 vaccine-preventable deaths?" This dev-

astating number is higher than a previous estimate by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, and Harvard School of Public Health, that 232,000 American deaths could have been prevented had the deceased been vaccinated.

"All of this comes down to trust—whether the political leadership creates a climate of trust in public health agencies' efforts, in the science," says Dr. Thomas Tsai, co-author of Harvard's analysis.

Spain's Government's Impressive About-Turn: Democratic Horizon For Catalonia?

To the Editor:

Today's Spanish nationalism was heavily influenced by General Franco's forty years of dictatorship. Due to international pressure, fascism agreed to move towards a more or less democratic system and was therefore not defeated and eradicated as in Germany or Italy. In Spain, fascism persisted, more or less disguised, at the base of the army, the police, big business, the Popular Party (the PP was founded by seven of Franco's ministers), the media and the judiciary.

This overwhelming domination by the heirs of the regime caused even the most open or left-wing sectors to drift towards a supremacist nationalism that excluded those who were different and tended towards aggressiveness. And it was further accentuated by the confrontation against the armed struggle of Basque independence, in which all means were used to win at any cost for the sake of the sacred unity of Spain. And they have treated the peaceful and democratic Catalan independence movement equally, legitimising the use of all the tools of the state (police, secret services, media and judicial system) to destroy the supposed enemy.


The Spanish Socialist Workers' Party, PSOE, which had supported the PP's outrages, continued the dirty war when it governed from 2018. At the same time, far-right politicians within the PP created their own party VOX, against feminism, immigrants and the Catalans and Basques. In its beginnings, the PSOE demanded that VOX be in the televised debates with the intention of damaging the PP electorally, although it was not appropriate because they were an extra-parliamentary force. In the short term the PP lost votes at the expense of VOX, but then the beast became big and now everyone is regretting it.

In the 2023 elections, the PP won but could not form a government, while the PSOE's Sánchez could form a government if he got the support of Junts, the pro-independence party of Carles Puigdemont, exiled in Belgium and whom the PSOE had vilified to dehumanising extremes. Now that they need his support, Puigdemont has demanded a "historic agreement" to democratically resolve the Catalonia-Spain conflict, foreseeably with a referendum. Puigdemont has set the following conditions: an end to the dirty war, the removal of independence from Europol's terrorist list, an amnesty for all those persecuted by the "lawfare" (judicial dirty war) carried out by the Spanish justice system, and negotiations in Switzerland with international mediation.

Sánchez has accepted everything, because he wants to stay in power, but also because it was reasonable and it was the opportunity to put an end to the orgy of repression that had become

unsustainable. This abuse by the state could no longer be sustained, because independence has been winning elections, because Spain has been condemned by the Council of Europe and the United Nations, and because the lawsuits that the Catalan independence movement has brought against Spain before the European courts are about to come to light.

From now on, Sánchez has the difficult task of explaining why he is amnestying the Catalan independence movement if, until now, he said that they were criminals who could not be negotiated with. The right wing is right to criticise him for having made a U-turn out of a lust for power and because the PSOE governs almost nowhere and, to maintain the party, it needs the economic income allowed by the central government. We shall see if Sánchez's personal need can help find a democratic solution to the eternal Spain-Catalonia problem.

At the moment, there are people demonstrating in the streets against stopping the judicial prosecution of Catalan "coup perpetrators." The PP will try to make Sánchez pay a price for separating himself from nationalist postulates and VOX accuses Sánchez of being a coup leader, a dictator and compares him to Hitler. Protesters make fascist proclamations and call for the death of Sánchez and Puigdemont. From the army, some fifty retired military officers have called for a coup d'état to save the homeland and

nobody has said anything to them. And the judges have also protested against the allusion to "lawfare" because they say it undermines the separation of powers. They have even demonstrated in their robes, violating the principle of non-participation in politics and, worst of all, they are forcing the judicial machinery to convict the maximum number of people before the amnesty and they are raising the charges to terrorism so that they cannot benefit from the amnesty.

The amnesty law is being processed, but the fact is that in Spain there has never been a problem with the laws, nor with the ordinary justice system comparable to that of Europe, but rather the problem is with the high judges when they have to judge Catalan pro-independence supporters, because then they use justice for political ends to harm their enemy.

In any case, the facts show a powerful Catalan independence movement that has managed to force the Spanish state to contradict itself and accept an amnesty that all state powers described as impossible until four months ago. We shall see how events evolve.

nies that don't want to be held accountable for exploiting hardworking taxpayers," Accountable. US spokesperson Chris Marshall said Wednesday. "The American public can't afford to suffer from this broken, polluting system any longer."

Thanks to the panel's party-line vote, H.R. 6009 now moves to the House floor. It faces far better odds of passing the GOP-controlled lower chamber than the divided Senate—but even if the bill got through Congress, Biden could veto it.

I Pledge Allegiance...

Way back in 2006, a few years after the 9/11 attacks, I was teaching at the Haverford School for Boys. Our a cappella choir, the Notables, was hosting a companion choir from a school in Denmark, and each choir member hosted a Danish boy. One morning, one of my students told me this story:

He and his Danish guest were driving to school when the Danish boy asked Neal if the day was some sort of holiday. Neal replied that it wasn't. The Danish boy asked, "So why are there so many American flags all over the place?"

The American flag has always been a revered symbol, certainly in my lifetime. Back in the late 1980s and early 1990s, the issue of flag-burning was all the rage with efforts by presidents and representatives to make flag-burning unconstitutional and a criminal offense.

Nevermind that most Americans never saw, have never seen, and will never see an American flag burned. I mean in person. Not just a video rerun, which can be broadcast and rebroadcast over and over and over again, leaving the impression that American flags get burned all the time, which is simply not true.

I can certainly understand the iconic and inspirational value of raising the Stars & Stripes at the top of Mt. Suribachi on Iwo Jima in February 1945. That image, particular to the U.S. Marine Corps but sculpted in larger-than-life-size bronze, graces Arlington National Cemetery.

But since 9/11, the fetishization of our flag has become epidemic, ridiculous, even comedic. In the wake of

9/11, for instance, the state of Pennsylvania enacted a law requiring that the American flag be displayed in every classroom of every public, private, and parochial school in the state. I haven't checked, but I'll bet Pennsylvania isn't the only state to pass such a law.

And I'll bet dollars to donuts that you can't find a politician wearing a suit who isn't sporting an American flag lapel pin. Or a car dealership that isn't flying an American flag so large it takes gale force winds to make it fly, which is especially delicious when the cars on sale are Japanese, Korean, and German.

It has become *pro forma* now that every National Football League game begin with a couple of hundred people dragging out an American flag big enough to cover the entire playing field, frantically waving their arms to make the flag appear to be rippling in the breeze. The flag ripplers are as often as not active duty military personnel, veterans, police officers, firefighters, or emergency medical technicians.

The players themselves now have little American flags affixed to the back of their helmets so that, in the course of watching a game, one is reminded hundreds and hundreds of times that football is an American sport and we live in the United States of America. The same is true of many if not all college football teams, and high school teams as well.

Every NASCAR race begins with a Color Guard and presentation of the Colors. When one of my nieces was a high school senior, the school posed her in front of an American flag backdrop for her graduation photo. And this was a

Quaker school. The cheeseburger I ordered recently at a restaurant came with a little American flag stuck in it and "W.D." written on it in black ink. It thought it was in honor of me since my initials are W. D. for William Daniel, but it turned out to mean "Well Done." During the major league baseball playoffs, the Philadelphia Phillies' Alec Bohm was wearing an American flag headband, on which he was clearly sweating profusely.

Nazi Germany made a fetish out of its Swastika flag. Watch any Nazi propaganda film—I suggest Leni Riefenstahl's "Triumph of the Will"—it will send chills down your spine. The Democratic People's Republic of Korea—Kim Jong Un's North Korea—likes to "show the flag." So did the Ku Klux Klan when it marched in the streets of Washington, D.C., back in the 1920s.

I don't know of any other country in the world that makes such a big deal out of their national flag, that demands you see it a dozen or forty or seventy or a hundred times a day lest you forget what country you live

All of which is especially ironic because today's United States of America is about as disunited as it has been since the decades leading up to our Civil War. Many of the insurrectionists who stormed the Capitol on January 6th, 2021, were carrying American flags, some of them emblazoned with images of the 45th president, or AR-15s, or both. The Proud Boys regularly wear or carry American flags. You can find photos of Proud Boys wearing American flag bandanas to hide their faces.

In an essay called "Flag-Burning" that appeared in the Philadelphia Inquirer on October 25th, 1989, I wrote that when the substance of freedom is subverted by a hypocritical genuflection to the symbols of freedom, we're all in a whole lot of

A quarter of a century later, we find ourselves living in a country where mass murder has become routine; legislators send Christmas cards to their constituents with all their family members armed to the teeth and smiling happily; vaccinations are perceived as a Deep State plot; facts are treated as "fake news"; Moms for Liberty are convinced that teachers are trying to make their kids gay; white men are an "oppressed minority;" immigrants are unwelcome; maldistribution of wealth is worse than it was in Medieval Europe; the front-running Republican candidate for the presidency of the nation our flag represents is a twice impeached, 91 times indicted, narcissistic grifter; the Democratic front-runner is already the oldest sitting president in U.S. history with the next election still a year away; and elections are always stolen unless the guy we voted for wins.

And over it all, above it all, in the midst of it all, everywhere you look: the Red White & Blue of the Stars & Stripes. What so proudly we hail.

Why Is My Doctor Unionizing?

You wait a month to get a doctor appointment, then you sit in the waiting room an hour because Dr. Incorporated is perpetually overbooked, then you're finally rushed in for your 10-minutes with the doc... tick, tick, tick... and then you're scooted out, uncertain whether you're supposed to take pills or make funeral arrangements.

Welcome to corporatized, consolidized, and bureaucratized "healthcare"—a rigid system in which nurses, pharmacists, and even doctors are no longer independent health professionals driven by a moral mandate to provide their best care to patients. Instead, all are treated as cogs in a monopolistic structure driven by an imperative to provide maximum profit to Wall Street owners of the corporate-care chains. This financial hierarchy demands factory-like cost-cuttingincluding cutting the numbers of nurses, pharmacists, and physicians who actually provide the care.

The cutbacks leave remaining caregivers stressed to the breaking point, and "care" is regimented to such time-motion metrics as limiting doctors to only 10 minutes per patient. Next!

Even when professionals complain that corporate cutbacks are endangering patients, the hierarchy responds with irrelevant financial statistics. For example, when Walgreens' pharmacists recently revolted against constant staff cuts, the chain's corporate bosses coldly retorted that they were investing \$400 million in new pharmacists. Sounds like a big number, but really? Walgreens is pocketing \$27 billion this year in profit! So, investing under two percent of one year's profit will not make a blip in service to patients. Instead, the bulk of the billions that consumers pay goes to enrich top executives and Wall Street investors.

This enrichment of the rich few at our expense is why health care providers are unionizing—not for themselves, but for us patients. For information and action, go to doctorscouncil.org.

Admiral Fowle's Piscataqua River Tidal Guide (Not for Navigational Purposes)

Portsmouth, arguably the first town in this country not founded by religious extremists, is bounded on the north and east by the Piscataqua River, the second, third, or fourth fastest-flowing navigable river in the country, depending on

whom you choose to believe. The Piscataqua's ferocious current is caused by the tide, which, in turn, is caused by the moon. The other player is a vast sunken valley Great Bay — about ten miles upriver. Twice a day, the moon

drags about seventeen billion gallons of seawater - enough to fill 2,125,000 tanker trucks — up the river and into Great Bay. This creates a roving hydraulic conflict, as incoming sea and the outgoing river collide. The skirmish line moves from the mouth of the river, up past New Castle, around the bend by the old Naval Prison, under Memorial Bridge, past the tugboats, and on into Great Bay. This can best be seen when the tide is rising.

Twice a day, too, the moon lets all that water go. All the seawater that just fought its way upstream goes back home to the ocean. This is when the Piscataqua earns its title for xth fastest current, Look for the red buoy, at the upstream end of

Badger's Island, bobbing around in the current. It weighs several tons, and it bobs and bounces in the current like a cork.

The river also has its placid moments, around high and low tides. When the river rests, its tugboats

and bridges work their hardest. Ships coming in laden with coal, oil, and salt do so at high tide, for more clearance under their keels They leave empty, riding high in the water, at low tide, to squeeze under Memorial Bridge
