elevision news outlets rou-**⊥** tinely solicit commentary from former Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich, a Georgia Republican who cheated on his first wife by sleeping with his second, then cheated on his second wife by sleeping with his third while simultaneously impeaching the President for lying about an affair. Gingrich tweeted on Monday, "Left has to lie because they can't defend their reality." In Pensacola last Friday he said, "When Iran, when they circle our beautiful destroyers with their little boats, and they make gestures at our people that they shouldn't be allowed to make, they will be shot out of the water" — because those gestures won't be directed at our beautiful destroyers, they'll be directed at him, and his tiny little hands

Some military veterans have voiced the reassuring theory that if Trump were to be elected, the Defense Department's generals and admirals would, in effect, serve as our last-ditch defense against a lunatic in the Oval Office. As military professionals steeped in the laws of war, they would stand up to the President if he issued illegal orders. That argument was undermined recently when 88 retired generals and admirals endorsed Trump. That's a lot of brass; but then, it takes a lot of brass to back a draft-dodging chickenhawk who "earned" a Pur-

In lieu of personal experience in uniform, Trump touts his purported prescience by reminding people that, unlike Hillary Clinton, he opposed the War in Iraq. actually a lie. Unfortunately, experience has shown that liars are not barred from the Presidency.

More Regulators Gone Wild

According to Rep. Jeb Hensarling (R-Texas), Chairman of the House Financial Services Committee, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau [CFPB] is "undoubtedly ... the single most powerful and least accountable federal agency in all of Washington."

Sen. Ted Cruz [R-Texas] warned last year, "Don't let the name fool you, the CFPB does little to protect consumers. The agency continues to grow in power and magnitude without any accountability to Congress and the people. The only way to stop this

runaway agency is by eliminating it altogether."

John Stumpf, the CEO of Wells Fargo, probably agrees, but it would be a little too late to help his outfit — Wells Fargo just coughed up \$185 million in penalties because the CFPB didn't like the way it was doing business.

Worker bees at Wells Fargo's community banking division forged signatures to open up 1.5 million "ghost" bank accounts and 565,443 credit card accounts which customers knew nothing about — until they got whacked with fees because their money was not where they thought it was. Employees did this, they say, to meet impossibly high quotas for new accounts and to avoid being fired if they failed.

Curiously, the *LA Times* notes that, despite this rather extravagantly bad behavior, "suits filed by Wells Fargo customers over fake accounts have not made it [to court]. As at many other banks,

Wells Fargo customers sign a contract requiring them to bring any disputes with the bank to a private arbitrator rather than to court."

Though his company is paying out \$185 million in fines, Stumpf insisted that it had offered its employees "no incentive to do bad things" — it was just 3,500 bad apples, who have all been dismissed

Wells Fargo's community banking division has been headed since 2008 by Carrie Tolstedt. Fortune reported Monday that Tolstedt made \$1.7 million a year, plus bonuses and stock options, while managing those bad apples. "Tolstedt was regularly praised for her unit's ability to get customers to open numerous accounts," according to Fortune.

Tolstedt recently announced that she's retiring. She'll get a \$125-million golden parachute.

As Fortune notes, Wells Fargo was among the banks which vowed, after the debacle of 2008, to clawback executive compensation derived from bad management practices "[b]ut there is no sign that Wells Fargo is going to ask Tolstedt to return even a sliver of her stock jackpot."

A Very Rude Awakening

Early on Sunday morning, September 21, 2008, Noel and Carla Wilson and their three children, ages nine, six, and two, were sleeping upstairs in their home in the suburbs of Kenosha, Wisconsin. Then, at about 5:30 a.m., they were awakened when the doors to their bedrooms were blown off their hinges.

A Robinson R44 helicopter had crashed through the back roof of their home, plunged down their staircase, and burst out of the house through their front door. After sliding across the street it was consumed by fire on their neighbor's yard across the street.

The Wilsons, uninjured, were lucky. The intruders, not so much: thrown from the wreckage, they were found dead on the lawn.

The pilot, Alan J. Sapko, had flown with his girlfriend Joan Anzalone from Kenosha to the Horseshoe Casino Heliport in Whiting, Indiana the previous evening. According to the NTSB's report of the incident, the couple arrived at the casino about 7:07 p.m. and stayed exactly 10 hours, departing the heliport at 5:07 a.m. Sapko drank wine with his dinner and, between 1:39 a.m. and 4:23 a.m., he was seen drinking Captain Morgan and diet Coke while the couple gambled.

Sapko was the owner of Sapko International, in Sturtevant, Wisconsin. The company came under investigation in April of 2007 after a prisoner at Kenosha Correctional Center called the U.S. Customs Service. Kevin Wilke alleged that Sapko was using prison labor to remove "Made in Bangladesh" labels from imported clothes, and sew on tags saying "Made in USA."

"He had a special Dumpster just for tags," Wilke told the Racine, Wisc. *Journal Times*. ICE

agents seized 234,500 pairs of jeans from Sapko, the *Twin Cities Pioneer Press* reported in July, 2008.

John Christman, who managed the tire mounting department of Sapko International's shipping division, confirmed Wilke's account. He added that Sapko hired employees for his department at \$7 an hour with a promise of a raise in 30 or 60 days, but the raises never came.

"Christman said he often tried to get Sapko to follow through with raises, to stabilize the work force," according to the *Journal Times*. "He believes that is why Sapko one day fired him, without explanation.

"In another matter involving Alan Sapko, the Wisconsin Department of Revenue on Tuesday filed a warrant against him for delinquent taxes of \$162,707.88...."

Law-Breaking Lawmakers

Recupero vowed that, as a State Representative, he would "Promote a Higher Standard of Ethics in Government," according to the professionally-printed flier a *Gazette* subscriber found in his mailbox on Tuesday, September 6th.

The flier's reference to ethics is ironic, since its presence in the mailbox violated 18 U.S. Code § 1725. It carried no stamp or indicia (a printed marking used to




The Flag Police, though, are cursed with an ingrained compulsion to observe the slightest detail. At least three of those flags require replacement.

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


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indicate postage has been paid). The law says "Whoever knowingly and willfully deposits any mailable matter [blah blah blah] on which no postage has been paid, in any letter box [blah blah blah] on any mail route with intent to avoid payment of lawful postage thereon, shall for each such offense be fined under this title." The Postal Service has been duly notified; we'll see what comes of this.


But wait — there's more! As seems standard among Republicans these days, Recupero is a man of his convictions regardless of the facts. Despite volumes of evidence to the contrary, he's convinced there's a lot of voter fraud going on. In an August 31st radio interview he told Rich Girard, "the more you look into it, the more you see that people are just bused in from out of state and they vote."


That delusional view is particularly interesting in this case because, in order to vote for Recupero, our subscriber would have had to commit fraud. Recupero, 23, ran for one of three seats representing Hillsborough County District 2, which encompasses Deering and Weare. Our subscriber lives in the town of Hillsborough, which is in District 1.

In the real world of facts and such, voter fraud is exceedingly rare. NBC News reported in August that a study of 2,068 alleged election-fraud cases in 50 states between 2000 and 2012 found only 10 cases of voter impersonation, the only kind of fraud that could be prevented by voter ID at the polls.



Cochranism Delineated!

There was a time when a person plagued with an ill-defined malaise could cure himself with the purchase of a colorful, expensive plastic device — derided by skeptics as a "Holy Healing Hockey Puck" — from a Post Office box across the river in Kittery. Then, ten years ago, callously disregarding the health of wealthy hypochondiacs, Maine's Attorney General shut down the Gentle Wind Project.

As it happens, the Gentle Wind Project was not the first weird cult to make York County its home.

In the aftermath of 1816's "Year Without a Summer," when crops suffered during very cold weather, and amid the growing tensions of rapid social change and the political push for statehood, Jacob Cochran arrived in northern York County, Maine, preaching a highly unorthodox theology borrowing from various churches while adding in his own radical teachings including, most infamously, the doctrine of free love or "spiritual wifery."

Cochran espoused these beliefs for years to a growing flock, de-

spite the preachings and warnings of local ministers like Reverend Ephraim Stinchfield. In 1819, Stinchfield wrote a pamphlet entitled "Cochranism Delineated," and subtitled "Religious Hydrophobia," in an attempt to check the sexy sect's growing popularity.

Cochran was eventually arrested, tried, and sentenced to prison for adultery and lascivious behavior. That ended his career, although controversy and questions remained, including the sect's role and influence in the development of Mormonism a decade later. The shock waves created by Cochran continued to roil through York County families and communities for several generations.

Brad Fletcher, chair of Berwick Academy's history department, will give a talk called "Cochranism Delineated!" on Thursday, September 22nd, at the Academy's Jeppesen Science Center.

"Beyond being a fascinating and wild story in itself," said Fletcher, "Cochranism tells us much about society, religion, gender and politics in the earliest days of Maine's statehood."

The event will begin at 7:30 p.m.; admission is by donation;

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

The Diogenes of Davis Hill

uring my childhood our house marked the end of the passable portion of Davis Hill Road. Except for a couple of months in summer, we had the hill to ourselves, and I was allowed to run wild, roaming woods that were just growing in after a century and a half of farming. Cellar holes lay here and there, and the abandoned, 1865-vintage French place was still precariously upright. I was strictly forbidden to enter that house, so of course I went through it like a dose of salts, but I was more observant of my parents' strictures to avoid the open wells that sat not far from the cellar of every former farm-

Opposite the French place sat the George Moore lot, a furlong or so down the road from us. There was a shallow cellar hole that was always choked with tiger lilies, and a well with a crude cover of homemade cement. I don't remember ever seeing a house there, although I roamed that far at least as early as 1956 or '57. It was about then that my parents and I went down there one evening to fetch a truckload of tiger lilies to plant around our house.

George Moore was born in Nova Scotia in August of 1865, but migrated to the United States in 1887. Not long after his arrival he must have found work in South Conway, for in 1892 he married Nellie Eaton, whose father owned the ancestral farm on the Brownfield Road. Over the next five years they had three children. George did whatever he could for a living, and at the turn of the century he was working at the paper mill in Berlin, lodging his family in a tenement on Goebel Street. Nellie died in 1905, at 42, and most of the time thereafter the children lived with her widowed sisters in South Conway while George boarded wherever he happened to be working.

The children kept George com-

ing back to South Conway. His son and one daughter eventually moved away, but his daughter Merle married Ivory Cole, a South Conway farmer who lived at Goshen Corner. In 1924 George bought an old camp on an acre of land atop Davis Hill, one mile from them. My father, who was going to high school at the time, knew both Ivory and George, and he remembered Ivory for the jug of hard cider he always kept hanging in the well under a trap door in his barn. His main recollections of George involved the lantern he used to carry when he came down the hill to visit Ivory — like an old philosopher looking either for an honest man or an honest man's jug.

The lantern played another part in my father's description of George Moore, who was perennially threadbare and broke. When the headlights on his old Model T Ford had both burned out, he strung a rope between them and hung his lantern on it. The rough

dirt roads and the faintness of the beam required him to take it pretty slow, and my father said they could always tell it was him coming by the sound of his glacial progress.

In 1935, something went awry. Merle and Ivory split up and sold the farm back to his mother, who lived across the road — which may have been part of the problem, for she was described to me as a tightfisted and spiteful old virago. They both quickly remarried, Ivory moving to Maine and Merle to Massachusetts, and suddenly George was alone on top of Davis Hill.

In the infancy of Social Security, an old man had to work until the end of his days. George was still employed until at least 75, calling himself a woodchopper when people asked his occupation, and he may have taken part in the logging-off of the east side of the hill, just before World War II; the stumps were mossed-over and beginning to turn phospho-

rescent in my teens. George had trouble earning enough to live on, especially during the Depression, and in 1937 Merle and her new husband had to redeem her father's camp for \$5.81 in unpaid

My grandfather spent World War II on Cape Cod, covering for Welfleet's town doctor, and was not around to tend George in his last illness. He died August 5, 1943, the day before his 78th birthday. Merle buried him in the Cole family lot in Center Conway, and now she lies there, too, right between her father and her ex-husband. In 1946 my uncle bought the tumbledown camp for \$25 in back taxes, and today the lot separates two suburban driveways. The canopy of trees has nearly killed off the lilies, but their descendants survive in abundance at my house.

Take the MBA degree she got from West Virginia University, an academic credential bestowed on her 10 years after she left the school, having completed only about half of the coursework required to get a degree. The state university later conceded that Bresch was awarded the MBA because ... well, be-

It's this sort of ethical "grit" that Mylan's chief exec has employed to pick the pockets of thousands of vulnerable customers who rely on EpiPen, the life-saving medical treatment for deadly allergies that her corporation monopolizes. multi-million-dollar annual pay by nearly 700 percent. She certainly is helping to "make a difference"— by helping herself, that is.

Bresch's greed has sparked a furious public backlash, but several top advocacy groups for allergy patients are curiously silent about her gouging of EpiPen patients. Why? Perhaps because she has doled out millions of dollars in "partnership" grants to them, effectively buying their allegiance.

Meanwhile, Congress does nothing, for Mylan and Big Pharma are major campaign donors. It's not grit and work ethic that makes today's drug makers so rich — it's their unrestrained greed, bribery dollars, and systemic ethic of corruption.

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
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
